Principal Report

WHAT WAS SO GREAT THIS WEEK

It has been a very positive response from the students who have been sitting their Naplan test over the last 2 weeks. The online version seems to have worked well and we haven't had any glitches so far. A big thank you to Mr Chapple for organising and running the timetable so flawlessly for all the classes that needed to be fitted into Th@ Space to complete their tests. Any students who missed out because they were away will have a chance to do the catch up over the next few days. Well done to all the students who gave it their best shot, that's all we ask of you.

STEPPING UP OUR NUDE FOODS INITIATIVE

Last year our school initiated Nude food days across the school. Students were encouraged to bring their healthy lunches in containers that were reusable, thus reducing the amount of waste in the environment. At the same time this encourages children to eat food that is not packaged, more fruit and vegetables. Our community did a great job getting on board with their support of this initiative. This year we are hoping to expand what we are doing. Each year our school spends a significant amount of money on rubbish and waste removal. In an effort to curb this we are going to start asking parents to pack student's lunch boxes with reusable containers. But if this isn't always possible we will be asking students to bring any waste/packaging home with them in their lunch boxes. I am letting parents know now so you have a chance to start thinking about what changes you might be able to make and get preparing ready for **term 3**, when we will begin. You are also welcome to start any time you like, if you would like to start sooner. I have discussed this initiative with the P & C at the last meeting and they were all very supportive and encouraging about getting started. We look forward to all of your support.

REFLECTION ROOM

We have changed the name and the format of how we work with students who have not followed the school rules. It is no longer referred to as a detention, it is now called the Reflection Room. Students will attend during their lunch break and be participating in more of a restorative practices format where they work together as a group to reflect of what has happened and how things could have been handled in a more productive way. Students will be handed a small blue slip at the end of the session to bring home to let parents know they have attended the reflection room that day. We are also looking at the best system to put in place to directly contact parents to let them know their child has attended also, we will be trialling text messaging to see how this goes.

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As with most things we change, there will be a trial and error period as we work to make what we're doing successful for all involved. We appreciate your patience and any feedback you might have if your child attends the reflection room. You could have a discussion with them about what they did and what they thought or took away from the time spent on reflecting on their behaviour.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

I just want to let parents know that our school is very proactive about ensuring students wear the correct uniform to school. Teachers will ask students who repeatedly come to school out of school uniform to explain why and encourage them to make the effort to correct the situation. We understand that there can be times when things happen that prevent students from being in school uniform but some students do it on a regular basis. Please do not be offended if any teacher asks your child about being out of uniform, often we will provide an alternative for them so they can be in uniform. Teachers would also ensure that they ask your child in a way that does not embarrass them or bring attention to it in front of everyone. We also want students to take responsibility for themselves and the part they can play in wearing the correct uniform. Wearing the correct school uniform, including a green school jumper, helps to promote pride in their school and a sense of belonging to students. We appreciate parent support in this matter. Don't forget we have a very large lost property box that is left on the verandah under the COLA that parents and students can access when things are lost, putting names on belongings also helps.





PSSA Basketball knockout

On Friday the 17th of May, both our senior boys and girls basketball teams had their first game of the State Knockout against Huskisson Public School. Both teams managed to secure a win with the girls winning 32 to 16 behind a huge scoring output by Joy Dann who top scored with 22 points. Joys offense was a product of some excellent full court pressure defense by Agnus Dann, Luca Barrett and Kayla Scott who caused multiple turnovers resulting in fast break points. It was a whole team effort, with Huskisson not giving up and having a clear height advantage. The girls got off to a slow start but managed to calm the nerves in front of a big home crowd and will face Culburra Public for the second round for another home game.

The boys game started very slowly with both teams showing early game nerves and struggling to hit shots. Huskisson again had a huge height advantage and took an early 4 to 2 lead. Oliver Driscoll then went on a scoring spree by hitting 14 of the teams first 18 points with Joe Lewis chipping in with 4 points of his own. The stifling team defense by Sanctuary Point kept Huskisson quiet in the first half and only allowed one more point. The halftime score was 26 to 5 as Sanctuary Point saw Brayden Waters score 8 straight points in the third quarter. Preston Stewart was able to stop the taller opponents by grabbing some big rebounds. It was a huge team effort with Oliver Driscoll being the lead scorer with 16 points, Brayden Waters with 14 and Joe Lewis with 8. The boys will face Milton Public school in the second round.
